

Note from the Stewardship Team

It's the time of year again where we prayerfully contemplate our giving for next year. Unlike most people in this congregation, I was actually raised in the United Church of Christ, so this is a familiar process for me.

We are always told, "it's not about money, it's about ministry," or "it's not about budget, it's about grace." Of course this is true, but let's face it, it is also about money. One of the most often used Bible verses during this time is, "Render unto Caesar that which is Caesar's, and render unto God that which is God's" which is said after Jesus asks his disciples to show him the money, which at that time had Caesar's image on it. Now look at our money. Oh yes, on the various bills and coins we have pictures of presidents and founding fathers but when you turn it over, there is God's *name* right there!

This has always made me think that whoever designed our currency was a Congregationalist who was, quite obviously, on the Stewardship committee at his church!

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Electronic Giving Is Available

If you wish to have your pledge or offering automatically transferred from your checking account to Riviera UCC's Space Coast Credit Union account, please see me to attain the form needed. You can choose to have your money transferred on the 1st or the 15th of the month, or both if you wish to divide the transfers. The church covers the charge for the transfer and the entire process is handled by Vanco Services of Minnesota, the United Church of Christ recommended intermediary. January 2009 would be an excellent time to begin electronic giving.

This service has proven to be a very convenient and reliable method for fulfilling pledges for several of our church members. I know that I especially appreciate the availability of automatic transfer for many of my obligations and bills. It saves me time and materials and keeps many of my commitments on track. It is especially reassuring to know that my pledge to RUCC's ministry is always on schedule. I encourage you to use the electronic giving opportunities the council has made available.

Next Adult Sunday School Class

From January 11 to February 22 Tony Misco, Lexi Wright and Rev. Scott Elliott will be leading an Adult Sunday School class on Homosexuality, God and the Bible from 10 AM to 10:45 AM.

There is much debate among theologians and in the churches (and in the culture in general) on the matter of homosexuality. In six Sunday School classes we could not even begin to adequately consider the topic of homosexuality in our culture, or even all of the religious and theological ideas, concepts or arguments on the issue. What we hope to do in this short time together is to discuss some of the concerns and questions that face us at Riviera United Church of Christ and to offer class members approaches to better examine and discuss biblical texts that are commonly used to oppose homosexuality.

We assume that class members are at least aware that the Bible has been used by many Christian leaders and churches as a source of opposition to homosexuality and discrimination as well as condemnation of homosexuals. We also assume that many Christians think that the Bible does indeed provide prohibitions against homosexuality that are applicable in our day and age.

This class is not intended to stifle opinions or force ideas or beliefs upon class members. It is not meant to deny any one the right to follow their conscience and beliefs on this or any other matter. During the course all members of the class who wish to present an idea or concern or question are encouraged to do so, provided the matters are raised in a respectful manner. While homosexuality is an understandably "hot button" issue for many folks, it is paramount during this course that we remain respectful of each person even in the face of disagreement. All are welcome to attend the class and participate in the discussions. Please sign-up on the enrollment sheet found in the narthex.



Scott's Note: As a class leader and pastor of the church, I feel that it is important to disclose the following regarding this topic: As clergy, I feel called to follow my conscience and beliefs, and this class is taught based on conscious conclusions and heartfelt beliefs that homosexuality is a part of God's creation and that homosexuality as a part of creation is a very good thing. Genesis 1:31 declares that, "God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good." I also strongly believe that the Gospels and teachings of Jesus are about loving one another, and seeking for everyone (including our homosexual brothers and sisters) justice, righteousness and inclusion into community as equal children of God, just as God created them. Course co-leaders Lexi and Tony are in accord with my views on these matters, however, many Christians (and others) in our culture maintain that homosexuality is not good pointing to biblical verses as a means of supporting this conclusion. They often quote one or more of the following texts to prove their point: Genesis 19:1-29 (the story of Sodom and Gomorrah); Judges 19:1-30 (the story of the Levite's Concubine); Leviticus 18(1-5, 22) and 20 (1-2, 13) (on the ancient laws of Israel); the Pauline texts in Romans 1:26-27; 1 Corinthians 6:9-10 or the pseudo-Pauline text in 1 Timothy 1:10. The class hopes to equip members of the Riviera UCC community for discussion of these texts by asking questions and considering the contexts and other meanings the text might have.
